## Clare Winnicott Essay Awards for Social Work Practitioners and Social Work Students\*



These two annual awards of £300 each are made in honour of Clare Winnicott, OBE. Essays submitted for the award may refer to any field of social work, with children, families, adults or organisations. They will show emotional and intellectual sophistication. Essays will be explicitly informed by *psychodynamic*, *systemic*, or *relationship-based* theory, or a combination of these, in keeping with the remit of the *Journal of Social Work Practice*, where winning essays will be published.

- Word length: up to 3500 words
- Submission: electronic
- Essays must not identify the author but should be accompanied by an application form.
- Entrants should ensure anonymity in relation to people and organisations described, and ethical and professional standards of practice should be adhered to.
- Submission date and time: midnight on July 5<sup>th</sup> 2020
- Notification of judges' decision: September 1<sup>st</sup> 2020
- Awards presented at GAPS Conference, 9<sup>th</sup> October 2020
- Creative approaches are welcomed (work must be appropriate for print and online publication - questions regarding appropriateness will be answered in advance of submission)
